## GOD IS SUPREME!

David expressed it most poignantly in I Chron. 29:11-12, "Yours, O Lord, is the greatness, the power and the glory, the victory and the majesty; for all that is in the heaven and in the earth is yours; yours is the kingdom, O Lord, and you are exalted as head over all. Both riches and honor come from you, and you reign over all. In your hand is power and might; in your hand is to make great and to give strength to all." Don't you wish that you had the gift of expression as David? He found it easy to exalt his God for He was/is deserving. Though David was king over Israel, he understood where the true power rested.

He is sovereign because He and His word are absolute. He is sovereign because of His divine perfection. Man is subject to error and weakness (finite) but God is perfect in all His ways without limitation (infinite). David recognized that "we are all aliens and pilgrims before you...our days on earth are as a shadow, and without hope" (I Chron. 29:14-15). God is also sovereign because of His creative abilities.

David proclaimed "all that is in heaven and earth is yours...you are exalted as head over all...and you reign over all" (I Chron. 29:11-12). ## Perseverance of the Saints

Of the five tenets of Calvinism, perhaps the one most familiar to us is the last one, the perseverance of the saints, better known as “once saved, always saved.” This doctrine teaches that once you become a child of God, no matter what wickedness you do in this life, you can never lose your salvation. The idea is that if God determines every step of salvation that salvation must be perfect and complete for God is perfect. There is no free will. IN Calvinism one can neither accept salvation nor cast it aside.

Calvinists misuse several Scriptures as proof texts for this enticing, yet dangerous doctrine. Those passages include the “full assurance” statements: Colossians 2:2; Hebrew 6:11; 10:2; Romans 8:15-17 with Galatians 4:6. They use texts that underline God’s own faithfulness to his promises: John 10:27-19; Philippians 1:6; Romans 11:29; 2 Timothy 1:12; 1 Peter 1:5 and Romans 8:31-39. These passages do indeed teach that God’s will and desire is the salvation of his children and that He is able and willing to protect them from outside forces that would lead them away. These passages, however, leave room for the possibility that the disciple, in the exercise of free will, can choose to relinquish his salvation. God never moves first to cut off the relationship. He will never leave us.

Numerous passages and examples teach that one can indeed fall away. One such example is Judas. One of the ways Calvinists use to deny the possibility of falling is by arguing that the person was never saved anyway. They use Judas as an example, but it will never work. Judas Iscariot, Christ’s betrayer, died lost. Jesus called him the “son of perdition” (John 17:12). Peter said that he went to “his own place” (Acts 1:25). But was Judas ever saved?

In Acts 1.17, Peter said, “For he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry.” A part of that ministry included the ability to cast out demons in the work among the Jews (Matthew 10). Judas had that ability. If Judas was controlled by Satan, how could he cast out demons? Didn’t Jesus say that Satan would not be divided against himself. Judas was saved at the beginning.

I conclude this study of Calvinism with an excerpt from Jack Cottrell, in his book, The Faith Once for All: The assurance taught in Scripture is “...an assurance that is consistent with our continuing to meet the conditions upon which salvation was given to us in the first place. In fact, the overwhelming testimony of the NT is that *staying* saved is just as conditional as *becoming* saved. These are gracious conditions, of course, and not legalistic ones. As Christians we remain justified by faith, not by works of law” (Romans 3:28).
