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## A Mistake

Many preachers spend their time to combat the sects, to expose their errors and show the mistakes they make. This is all right if this work is kept in its right place, and not permitted to crowd out other more important work. There is great danger that we let opposition to the sects and to error usurp the place of fidelity to God and the practice of truth. It is easier to fight error than it is to practice truth. It is more in harmony with our fleshly nature to fight error and errorists than to subdue the flesh and obey God. So we often substitute that for this. Much of our zeal is for party dogmas rather than for practice of the truth.

Much of the preaching consists in opposing and exposing the errors of others. This party zeal becomes a substitute for love of truth and the practice of godliness. Many preachers seem to think that the way to convert the world is to expose religious error. Hence the preaching to the world is chiefly opposition to the sects. If the sects were all destroyed, it might be easier to convert the world, but the work of converting the world would still have to be done.

The wisdom of the serpent, as well as the harmlessness of the dove, is needed in preaching the gospel. It is more important to preach the truth than to expose the error. This was the order of Jesus and the apostles. They first presented the truth of God, the working principles of the religion of Christ. Jesus first gave the Sermon on the Mount, the exhibit of the practical truths of the religion he came to establish. He then opposed error as it conflicted with these truths. If we would practice this order now, it would greatly help us in our work. We would do better work, and do it more effectively.

When we go to a new place especially to preach, it seems to me common sense, as well as divine wisdom, would prompt us to first present the truth of God concerning the way of sal-vation, and stir up opposition as little as possible until they had seen the truth as a connected whole. To stir up the prejudices of the people is to prevent their seeing the truth with impartiality and fairness. It does them a wrong and defeats the end in view. There is very great danger in making ourselves sectarians in opposing sectarians. When we go to a new place, let us present the truth in as kind and gentle, yet as earnest, spirit as is possible. Present the truth in the spirit of the truth, and oppose errors only as others bring them up to conflict with truth. Do it with earnestness, but do it in a spirit of kindness and love, and prove by experience that the order of Jesus and the apostles is the best for us and for the world.

## **Am I Venting or Gossiping?**

Have you ever heard someone say that a wrong done by another person is between that person and God, but then they continue to talk about it? If it is between them and God, why do I even know about it in the first place? And if I do know about it, I should keep it there and not talk about it any further. If others are involved, I must let them settle the matter between them. If I myself am involved, then I must meet the other party in the middle and settle it together (Matthew 5:23-26). If the issue is not solved, then I am to take two or more with objective witnesses and arbiters. If that doesn't work, then I take it to the church. Jesus outlines this procedure in Matthew 18:15 for a reason: to protect the individual and to protect the church. I'm afraid too often we get this process backwards.

I can understand venting to someone if another person's behavior involves me. I might feel that the person won't listen to me about the wrong done to me and I'm seeking out advice. In fact, Jesus said that if the person won't listen, tell it to two others. It is not gossip if I must seek others' help and go with me. Motive is key. Am I trying to correct a wrong and save the person from eternal judgment? Or am I out to gain something? Am I doing it out of jealousy and just want to murder someone's reputation?

When I know that someone's sin has been forgiven by God and others, the conversation about their sin should stop immediately. Otherwise, the "venting" becomes gossip and makes you seem bitter, angry and spiteful. Gossip, whether the facts are true or not, can poisons someone's mind against the other person forever.

Love doesn't gossip; love keeps no record of wrongdoing (1 Corinthians 13:5). Let love lead.

# It's a Long Story

"He who is often rebuked, and hardens his neck, will suddenly be destroyed" -Proverbs 29:1

In August of 1989, a major fire broke out under an elevated section of New Jersey's Interstate 78. The intense heat buckled parts of the highway and forced the closing of the East Coast artery. The governor said it was the worst transportation crisis in years.

An investigation brought to light a longstanding problem. It revealed that the fire broke out in a dump site in which construction debris had been collecting for many years. The owners of the site had been convicted of a multimillion dollar conspiracy to allow the illegal dumping of construction debris. But appeals in federal and state courts frustrated New Jersey's efforts to clean up the area. Not until the day after the fire did a state appeals court finally order the operator of the dump to stop accepting trash and begin clearing the site.

This fire tells a basic story of life. Most of our problems don't just happen. They are the result of a long series of bad decisions. Second Chronicles 36 illustrates this and reminds us that God will not allow His children to continue in sin. Even though He is longsuffering, His patience has a limit. If we don't correct the problem ourselves, we can be sure that He will discipline us.

Let's clean up the trash in our lives today.
