Who Is Jesus?

Dysfunctional Families in Genesis: Adam and Eve Eric Welch

One special mark of biblical inspiration is the fact that the authors do not attempt to hide the messy lives of faithful historical figures. People sin and sin brings dysfunction to families. By presenting the sins of even God's people in all their ugliness, the Bible shines more brightly on God's infinite grace and holiness as He works through these dysfunctional families to restore the broken relationship with humanity. This series is all about that. What can we learn from the dysfunctional families of Genesis to help us love God and those made in His image more?

How was God's relationship to man broken in the first place? Let us first consider the awesome power of God's Word. When God said "Let there be...", something happened. Things obeyed. God shaped the earth, skies and seas and filled them with living things to reproduce after their own kind. The only creature that God did not fill the earth with was the one He would make after His own kind, in His own image (Genesis (1:26-27; 2:7). He gave the male and female sovereignty over the earth and the responsibility to fill it. Man is God's representative earth. To fill the earth would mean to spread God's glory over the earth.

However, one creature was not under man's control--the serpent. This cunning creature tempted Eve to disobey God by twisting God's words into a lie. This "father of lies" planted a seed of doubt into Eve's mind as he asks, "Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden'?" Eve replied, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden," but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the midst of the garden, neither shall you touch it, lest you die."

Then the serpent went for the kill: "You will not surely die. 5 For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." Out of all the good trees to eat, she was tempted to focus on what she could not have, instead of the gracious gifts that she could have. The serpent caused her to doubt God's word. When we doubt God's Word, we begin to doubt God's nature. He must be hiding something. "He doesn't want you to have what he has," the serpent seems to say. Whereas the entire physical universe obeyed God in chapter 1, by chapter 3, God's most responsible beings rebelled, causing all of God's creation to become dysfunctional, cursed. The serpent, Satan, had won the day (John 8:44).

How might this story relate to modern dysfunctional families? God had told Adam not to eat of "the tree of the knowledge of good and evil." Who revealed these instructions to Eve? Adam must have told her. When we compare God's instruction to Adam to what Eve tells the serpent, we find a slight difference. Eve said that she could not "touch" the forbidden tree. To keep from breaking the first commandment, she hedged around it a second one. We do not know if this was her interpretation of the command or Adam's? Either way, God's Word was changed. God did not say, "don't touch it." He had told Adam to tend the garden (Genesis 2:15). This instruction would have included the forbidden tree, which would have required touching it. Paul would later say that Eve was deceived (1 Timothy 2:15). However, Adam sinned knowingly. He had failed to protect his wife from the snake's bite.

From that moment, all humanity would bear the consequences of their sin--death (Romans 5:12). Satan might have won the day, but he did not win eternity. Humanity's hope would be found in Eve's Offspring who would heal the broken relationship caused by each person's choice to sin (Genesis 3:15).

Husbands, let us not only be material providers for our wives and families, but let us also be their spiritual protectors (Ephesians 5:25-26).
