### **The Body Is Not One Member but Many**

In the Lord's church, all have a part to play and a job to do, all are important (1 Cor. 12:14-18). Ask the question, "What can I do to make the work of the church a success?" Here are a few possible answers:

Market our congregation's website. Create a signature file in your email program to include the congregation's web address in every email. You might also utilize other electronic communication such as Facebook. If you pay bills or correspond via U.S mail, buy a rubber stamp with the web address and stamp your letters, bills etc.

Distribute tracts. We have tracts available in the foyer for this purpose. If you purchase a rubber stamp with the church's web address, stamp the tract and hand them out. Give them to people you know. Mail them to your friends and neighbors. (*note: It's illegal to put things in other's mailboxes.*)

Visit the elderly and shut-ins. Imagine for a moment that you've been active in the church for many years and now are in poor health. You relied on the edification when you were able to attend worship, the sermons, the prayers, the singing, the communion, but now there's a void that needs to be filled. In our bulletin there is a list of those who are exactly in this position (see the prayer list on page 3). It's our job to make sure they never feel forgotten. Call them, send cards, sing with them, read the Bible to them, discuss Eric's sermon or the Sunday morning Bible lesson with them, listen to their stories.

Participate in our Monday Night for the Master program when we begin meeting again September 11<sup>th</sup>.

One last suggestion, always be prayerful about the work being done, pray for the workers and the influence we can have on this community. We have many members who are diligently doing what they can to fulfill the physical and spiritual needs of the church and the Christian responsibilities/work that the Lord has put before us. But, we need more workers, there is much to do.

If these suggestions don't suit you look for those things that do. Let's use our talents working together in the kingdom of God.

## A Yoga Church?

Americans so divided politically and economically would do well to heed Jesus' words, "one's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). Indeed, Jesus had much to say about wealth and money, but often this obsession with stuff keeps people from hearing what He teaches.

Case in point, Jesus was teaching the crowd about fearing God when someone interrupted Him to ask a favor. "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me" (Luke 12:13). Whatever the man's problem, money had become the center of his life. His preoccupation for material things kept him from hearing Jesus' message that day. Jesus replied, "Man, who made me a judge or arbitrator over you?" (Luke 12:14). Jesus had not come to settle quarrels between Him and his brother?

Many people still see Jesus this way. They think He has come to fulfill their every need. Just today, someone called me at my study and asked whether the Hamburg Pike congregation offers yoga classes. I answered in the negative. Jesus came to seek the lost (Luke 19:10), to die for us. His mission is the church's mission. He wants each of us resisting Satan and stretching to win the race (James 4:7; 1 Peter 5:8-9; Philippians 3:13; 1 Timothy 4:8; 2 Timothy 4:7; Hebrews 12:1-2). What good will it do to live 99 years anyway only to lose eternal life (Matthew 16:26)?

Christ is often perceived as nothing more than a wise teacher, philosopher or social justice warrior. Just follow Jesus' teachings, they say, and you will prosper. Jesus did not come to earth to heal humanity's social ills, such as hunger, alcoholism, AIDS, crime and war. Whenever Jesus healed people of disease, He always met their spiritual need first, whether from the masses or from individual cases (Mark 2:1-12; Mark 9:35; cf. John 12:4-8).

Jesus' message for that brother and for us is "Take care, and be on your guard against all covetousness, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). He then elaborates with the parable of the rich farmer. The farmer was industrious and progressive. He had grown from production to storage. Yet, he invested in things, not in people and certainly not in God. Jesus' point is that if we collect riches as though God does not exist, we are fools.

Remember, Jesus says that we must be concerned about living for the kingdom of God, not how we are going to pay the bills (Luke 12:31). Invest in what will endure forever.
