If You Had Been Here

The September 2018 issue of Gospel Advocate features a series of articles centered on the theme “Where Was God?”. Where was God... When disaster struck? When I was sick? When my loved one died? When the wicked prospered? When the church fell away? These questions are dealt with in the articles.

In our study of Ruth, Naomi in a sense knew exactly where God was and He was out to get her. However, what these questions often have in common is that the sufferer does not deny God’s existence. He or she still believed in God, but in times of crisis, they had trust issues and struggled with doubt about whether God truly cares.

This age-old question even showed up while God was on earth. In John 11 one of Jesus’ friends, Lazarus, was on his deathbed. His sisters, Martha and Mary, sent a message to tell Jesus in order to get Him to come. However, when Jesus got the message, He waited two days before leaving. In the meantime, Lazarus died. When Jesus finally arrived, both sisters told Him, “Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died” (vv. 21, 32). The sisters had faith. Each calls Him “Lord.” Martha confesses Him as “Son of God.” But they were asking “Where was God?”. If Jesus could have done something about it, why didn’t He? Does He not care? Jesus did not rebuke their grief; He mourned it (v. 35. but told them that they would see God’s power in Him. As a result, their faith in Him would grow (v. 14, 25, 40). John 11:35

What we see in the stories of Ruth, Mary, Martha and Lazarus is that God works according to His will, not ours. We must learn to trust God’s sovereignty, that He knows best in our situation.

Where was God? Where He was when, in His love, He sent His own Son to the cross for us and where He will be on the Day of Judgment when He will mete infinite justice once and for all (John 3:16; Romans 5:8; Matthew 25:31).
